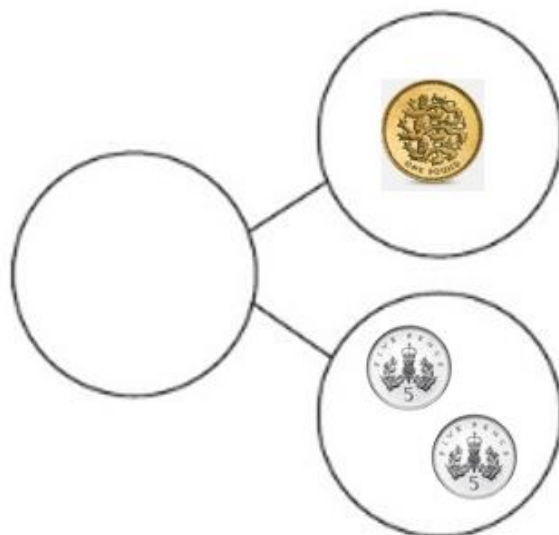
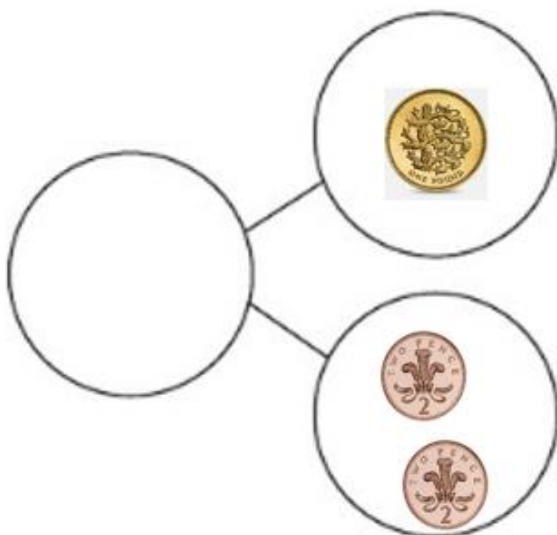

Exceptions

One notable exception is the word *soccer*. (We pronounce both the letters 'c' as a single /k/ sound
